The big headlines on [Brookings](#) home page most often draw the eye first upon entering the page – especially in the upper part. The institution's logo remains at the top left in order to easily return home. The menu is in the top right part of the page along with the search icon. The pages are easy to navigate due to the large font of the titles of articles. The introductory paragraphs are in boldface or larger font size. The clear illustrations and pictures related to the subject matter. The ability to eye-track visualizations allow the users access much of the information on the website. Users will find it effortless scroll look below the fold and access links to the full articles.

Why Would Students of Policy Be Interested (relevance to education, policy-centric):

Brookings has five [research](#) programs at its Washington, D.C. campus: Economic Studies, Foreign Policy, Governance Studies, Global Economy and Development, and Metropolitan Policy and three international centers based in Doha, Qatar (Brookings Doha Center), Beijing, China (Brookings-Tsinghua Center for Public Policy), and New Delhi, India (Brookings India).

Brookings was named best think tank for "Domestic Economic Policy" and "International Development," in addition to being "Best Managed," having "Best Quality Assurance and Integrity Policies," and having the "Most Significant Impact on Public Policy." An academic analysis of Congressional records from 1993 to 2002 found that Brookings was referenced by conservative politicians almost as frequently as liberal politicians, earning a score of 53 on a 1–100 scale with 100 representing the most liberal score. Lending itself to earning a fair and balance reputation. The same [study](#) found Brookings to be the most frequently cited think tank by the U.S. media and politicians.

Why evaluate web sites? No one judges the quality or accuracy of information found on the World Wide Web before it is published, so you must evaluate what you find for yourself. Some sites are created by experts; for example, the University of Maryland Libraries site is authored by librarians who have expertise in the field of information science. However, the vast majority of World Wide Web sites are designed and authored by non-experts.
